Double mission of European protected areas

- Nature (and cultural)
 Conservation
- Conservation of nature and human values in a territory.



- Use and enjoyment of the area by visitors

Basic Fundament of the Charter is PARTNERSHIP!

to prepare and implement a strategy and commit to sustainable practices.

Involve ALL involved in tourism

Create a permanent forum

Protect and enhance the areas natural and cultural heritage

Provide high quality visitor experience

Good integrated communications

Encourage tourism products that enable discovery of the area

Ensure tourism does not reduce quality of life of residents

Increase benefits from tourism to the local economy (local

The Charter is a practical management tool which helps protected areas to continuously improve the sustainable development and the management of tourism taking account of the needs of the environment, the local population and the local tourism businesses.

To improve the sustainable development and management of tourism in protected areas, which takes account of the needs of the environment, local residents, local businesses and visitors.

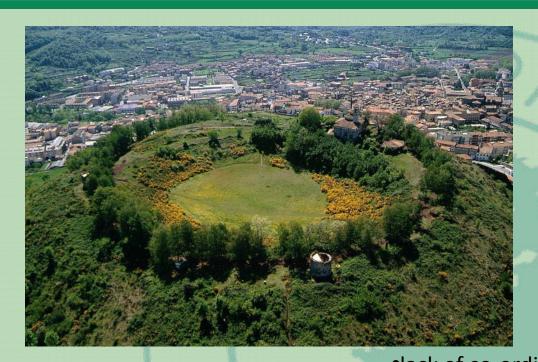




The European Charter emanated from a report by the EUROPARC Federation in 1993 called Loving Them to Death

(IUCN) action programme for protected areas in Europe, "Parks for Life" (1994).

- The Charter Network is now made up of 77 protected areas in 9 European Countries.
- They cover 4,6 M hectares, welcome 60 M visitors a year and are inhabited by 75 M inhabitants
- 266 local businesses have currently been certified under the Charter part II





•What were the challenges?

lack of co-ordination in the tourism sector of the area
 the rather bad and conflicting relationship between tourism businesses and public administration (councils, regional... including park authorities)
 low level of professionalism in many of the tourism businesses.

Spain's coastal tourism development show everybody what is NOT sustainable tourism and the dangers and damages it can produce.

La Garrotxa decided to try to influence its development by negotiation and permanent contact in partnership with the tourism sector as there were few legal power to do so.



The way to Partnership

identifying and meeting stakeholders more then 80% of tourism businesses in La Garrotxa and all the town councils, the park and others administrative bodies.

Sustainable regional development – current projects

 - Socio-economic effects for the benefits of protected areas
 - Transfer of the Charter to 6 protected areas in the BSR
- Sustainable Tourism Destinations (BfN)
 - 7 partners including a study group of Charter areas
 - Identification of the added value for Charter protected areas; analysis of the charter methodology and comparison with sustainable tourism destination assessment system; collection of best practice examples
- STEPPA: Sustainable Tourism in Enterprises, Parks and Protected Areas (DG Enterprise)
 - Better cooperation between Charter areas and local businesses
 - Research the added value of the Charter for local businesses
 - 11 partners from across Europe

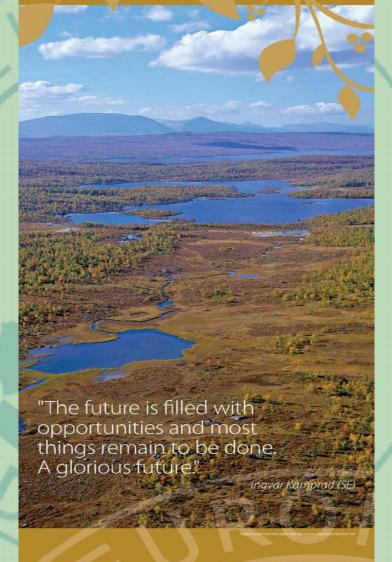












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
